It was an early start on a beautiful sunny morning as we made our way down the Mountain to Eden Indoor Nursery in Kriedeman Road. What an amazing nursery, full of not only indoor plants, but a large variety of shade-loving plants and interesting giftware. Purchases were made and we were off to Kingsholme.

Kerkin Garden is nestled in a lovely valley inland from Ormeau. Some of us had no idea this lovely area existed but others have visited previously. We were greeted by the owner John, with apologies from his wife Carol, who was in hospital. We all wished her well and signed the Visitors Book so John could show her our comments. The morning tea was fabulous and much appreciated. John then told us a bit about the story of how the garden began on land that had been part of his family farm. The garden is spectacular, and I personally was lost for words. It is quite a steep block, and the diversity and variety of plants is amazing. The weather was perfect, and we enjoyed a guided tour of the garden and John was able to explain the plantings and areas to us.

From Kerkin Garden we made our way to the Gold Coast Regional Botanic Gardens and it was surprising how many of us had never visited this fantastic garden. The garden volunteers had prepared tables and chairs under the shady trees for us to enjoy our picnic lunch, provided by Spice of Life. Kate explained the history of how the Gardens came about through the Rosser family and then took us on a guided tour around the original house. It was a fascinating story and gave us some background. We were then able to wander around the lake to see turtles, eels and water birds in abundance.

November in the Garden - a Snapshot

It's November and the jacarandas, agapanthus, hydrangeas, bougainvillea, flame trees and silky oaks are putting on an amazing display! The air is filled with the heavenly scents of jasmine, lavender and of course roses. Although we've had rain recently, the forecast is for a dry summer so November is all about being water wise and getting your garden ready to withstand the hotter, drier days.

What to plant in November

In the veggie patch sow or plant seedlings of Asian greens, basil, beans (French, climbing & snake), beetroot, cabbage, capsicum, carrots, chillies, chives, choko, cucumber, eggplant, ginger, kale, kohlrabi, leek, lettuce, melons, okra, parsnips, peas, potato, pumpkin, radish, rosella, silver beet, spring onion, squash, sweet corn, sweet potato, tomatoes and zucchini. For some colour sow or plant seedlings of alyssum, amaranthus, begonias, Billy buttons, Californian poppy, carnation, celosia, coleus, dahlias, dianthus, everlasting daisy, gerbera, globe amaranth, impatiens, kangaroo paw, marigold, petunia, phlox, portulaca, salvia, sunflower, torenia, verbena and zinnia.

Jobs to do in the lead up to summer include:

- Continue keeping the water up, apply liquid fertiliser, spray foliage with a seaweed emulsion and compost and mulch garden beds, veggie patches and under fruit trees and shrubs to maintain soil moisture.
- Get creative with some garden stakes/star pickets and shade cloth to make shade sails to maintain moisture for less heat tolerant plants when really hot.
- Move pot plants and containers into a shady place on really hot days and don't forget to water anything planted under your eaves.
- Leave some water out for birds, butterflies, lizards and of course pets.
- Keep the water up to hydrangeas, gardenias and azaleas. Pluck off and bag shriveled azalea flowers to break the cycle of petal blight.
- Sprinkle a small amount of potash around tomatoes and strawberries and water in to give them a potassium boost.
- Give formal hedges such as buxus and murraya a light trim, always ensuring the base is slightly broader than the top, and give lavender a trim by 1/3rd.
- If you haven't already done so trim camellias and shape if necessary, and remember the golden rule - never trim after Christmas to ensure the arrival of next year's blooms.
- Give bottle brushes a good prune when they have finished flowering so they keep their shape and don't become leggy.
